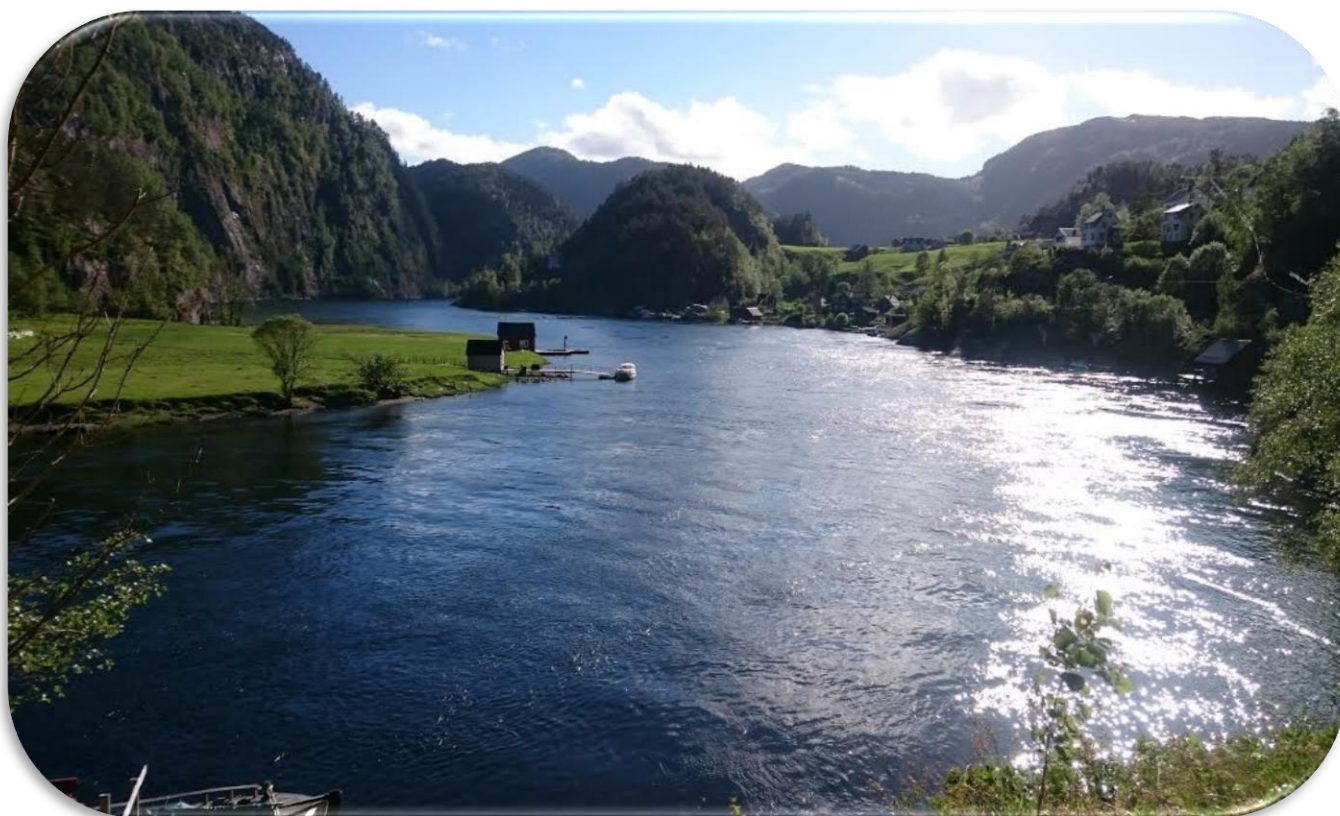

Presentation of speakers:



Dr. Tove Giske, Norway, is a Professor in Nursing at VID Specialized University, Faculty of Health Studies, Bergen. Her main research area is in spirituality. She is a part of the EPICC network and President of Nurses Christian Fellowship International



Dr. Wilfred McSherry, UK, is Professor in Nursing in a joint appointment between Department of Nursing, School of Health and Social Care, Staffordshire University and the University Hospitals of North Midlands NHS Trust and part-time Professor at VID Specialized University, Bergen, Norway.



Dr. Linda Ross, UK is a Professor in Nursing (Spirituality) at University of South Wales and Visiting Fellow Staffordshire University. She is also an EPICC Partner, Executive Editor of “Journal for the Study of Spirituality” and Member Secretary of British Association for the Study of Spirituality. Member of All Wales Spirituality Health & Wellbeing Special Interest Group.



Dr. Pamela Cone, CA is a Professor of Nursing in the Doctoral programs at Azusa Pacific University. She teaches courses in Research, Theory, Writing, and Qualitative Methods especially focusing on Grounded Theory. Her research interest is primarily in Spiritual Care, and she collaborate with Dr. Giske for research and writing.



Dr. Elizabeth Johnston Taylor, CA, PhD, RN, FAAN, Professor, Loma Linda University School of Nursing, Loma Linda, California, USA, has pursued a program of research exploring the intersection of spirituality, religiosity, health, and nursing for 25 years. Her latest book, *Fast facts about religion: Implications for nursing care* provides clinicians with healthcare-related information about religions.



Dr. Josephine Attard, Malta, is Head of the Midwifery Department and Lecturer at the Faculty of Health Sciences, University of Malta. Her professional work as a midwife is centered around pregnancy, labour and birth. Her research interests are in the areas of normal birth, midwifery education, and competencies in spiritual care in nursing and midwifery.



Dr. Bart Cusveller, The Netherlands, is PhD trained as a nurse and holds a degree in philosophy. He is currently a Senior Lecturer and researcher in spiritual care and nursing ethics at the School of Nursing of Viaa University of Applied Sciences in Zwolle, The Netherlands.



Dr. René van Leeuwen, The Netherlands, is leader of the Research Group Spirituality and Healthcare of Viaa University in Zwolle, Netherlands. The focus of the research group is competence development in spiritual care. He developed and validated the Spiritual Care Competence Scale (SCCS). He is as a partner involved in the EPICC project.



Dr. Erlinda Castro-Palaganas, The Philippines, holds a PhD, RN and is Professor at the University of the Philippines, Baguio. She is the national president of the Philippine Nurses Association and Founding President of the Philippine Nursing Research Society, Inc. She is an academic, researcher and development worker earned by many years of living with the people as a community health nurse.



Anne Biro is a Canadian nurse who has lived in Mongolia since 2004. Anne is interested in how different cultures understand and practice nursing. She is currently researching the roles and responsibilities of Mongolian nurses. Anne volunteers in a variety of areas and is the Vice-President of Nurses Christian Fellowship International.



Professor Emeritus **Barbara Parfitt**, UK, is a qualified nurse and midwife. After working as a community nurse midwife in Afghanistan and Bhutan, she married, completed her doctorate and was appointed as a nursing Professor, Dean and Secretary General of the WHO Nursing Global Network. In 2014, she established a Nursing School in Bangladesh. She currently works voluntary, supporting nurses in Pakistan. She is an honorary Doctor at VID Specialized University.



Edeen Jalloh, Sierra Leone is a state registered nurse from Sierra Leone and Ukraine. He is a master's holder in Global Health from the University of Bergen and UCL. Edeen Jalloh is working with Haraldsplass Diaconal Foundation on the project *"Providing hope to the rural poor of Sierra Leone"*



Benson Owusu, Ghana, is a registered general nurse at the intensive care unit of the Greater Accra Regional Hospital in Ghana. He holds a master of Public Health from the University of Ghana and is currently pursuing a PhD Public Health in the same university. He is the founder of the QUIK Medical Consult.
